3 day gravel ride:

I had a good time Thursday Friday and Saturday doing my first mainly gravel road tour of the mountains of Randolph and Pocahontas counties. Did not get too tired out and only had to do some walking up very steep hills a few times because of gravel on one area and degree of slope on another. On my last day ran into other cyclists for the first time and they were starting their own modified route we both got from https://bikepacking.com/routes/west-fork-overnighter/

I parked at the lot on top of Shavers Mountain just off Rt 33 and took a new road for me down to Alpena which was very bad and involved needing some walking. Next time would just go down the hill on Rt 33 but had never been to Alpena so wanted to check it out. The road from there to Glady was very quiet and then I walked to the top of the very steep hill to Bemis because I had never been there and there were some people fishing for trout because of recently being stocked in the Shavers Fork. I saw no signs of the railroad tunnel near Bemis but did get to walk to see the Glady side of the tunnel and along the way spoke to a local. I love to know the history of the railroad and the line use to go on to what is now the Greenbrier River trail.


The West Fork trail is very interesting and all along the way are information signs regarding the former towns. I saw no one else on that trail.

When I got to Durbin I road through town on Rt 92 because it is very quiet and I had not been there for years when I had used that as my cycling base and then started riding back north on Forest Service roads where I camped by myself at an official dispersed camping area where it was as if I was by myself because the sites are so spread out.




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The next day continued north and visited the Laurel Fork wilderness and campground and then later realized I was apparently off the forest service roads because of seeing a school bus. Back at Rt 33 went north via Sully Road which is a very back road along a ridge and then down a very steep paved slope to the Glady Fork valley to camp at the Lower Glady Dispersed campground.



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Each night I stayed at an official forest service area but the Friday night in Lower Glady was packed for the weekend and about a dozen people playing the game corn hole and everything from large tents to campers. I kept riding in the camping area knowing the road ended and luckily a good way from the numerous people got a nice quiet area near a nice sounding stream for my night and that was all I heard. The next morning spoke to turnkey hunters and trout fisherman and did some exploring of the Allegheny Trail which I was camped next to.



Saturday morning as I was leaving the campground everyone had their generators on because my thermometer had 34 degrees but luckily where I had camped I could not hear those. I then took Rt 12 back to Alpena and had to do some walking because of the steep slope coming out of the valley and being a little worn out from the previous days. I finally went back to view Rt 33 to see if I thought I could possibly ride up its very steep slope back to the top of Shavers Mountain and decided I would most likely be walking most of it and there was no siding of the road there so once again took the very bad route 12/1 back up probably walking most of it.

Overall I loved the route and can't wait to go back for rides and backpacking the area. My next trip will be to backpack from Canaan Valley to that area via the Allegheny Trail.



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
Good Bye to Dana King: Friday, May 14


ALLEGHENY RIVER TRAIL: July 24 and 25
